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INTRODUCTION

During the winter of 2008-2009, the country's economic ills resulted in marked increases in demand for social services of all sorts in the Old Lyme-Lyme area. Many families and households found themselves seriously stressed, and often didn't know where to turn. Agencies and organizations that provide relevant services found they knew too little about one another's activities to be as helpful and effective as possible when dealing with people in crisis situations.

In order to build greater awareness of which entities provide which services, a Community Resources Roundtable (CRR) was convened on March 19, 2009, bringing together representatives of a wide range of concerned public and private organizations. The Roundtable was sponsored by the Town of Old Lyme and the Lyme-Old Lyme Council of Churches. Timothy Griswold, First Selectman of Old Lyme, and Celine Sullivan, Convener of the Council of Churches, hosted the meeting.

Each participating organization was asked to describe its mission and the services it provides to people in crisis, and to identify its key contact people. Most provided this information in written profiles as well as in oral presentations. Their profile data is collected in this directory.

This directory should be regarded as a "living document," one that will be updated at regular intervals reflecting additions, deletions (hopefully few of those), corrections and changes -- as it moves into circulation and use, and as the economic crisis in America unfolds. Your comments, suggestions and updates will be most helpful in this regard. OVERVIEW

The spreadsheet which follows provides an overview of the many services catalogued in this directory – enabling the user to quickly identify likely resources in particular situations, then to move where appropriate to the more descriptive detail in the body of the document.

ORGANIZATIONAL PROFILES

The profiles which comprise this section were provided by the organizations Participating in the Community Resources Roundtable in March of 2009.

They are presented here in alphabetical order.

American Legion – Post 41

The American Legion was chartered by Congress in 1919 is a patriotic, mutual-help, wartime veterans organization. A community-service organization which now numbers nearly 3 million members – men and women – in nearly 15,000 American Legion Posts worldwide. These posts are organized into 55 departments – one each for the 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, France, Mexico, and the Philippines.

The American Legion's national headquarters is in Indianapolis, Indiana, with additional offices in Washington, DC. In addition to thousands of volunteers serving in leadership and program implementation capacities in local communities to the Legion's standing national commissions and committees, the national organization has a regular full-time staff of 300 employees.

The Lyme American Legion Post #41 was chartered late in 1919 and has been helping Lyme and Old Lyme veterans for 90 years. The Post holds it's meeting the fourth Tuesday of the month (except July and December) in the American Legion room in the Memorial Town Hall. The Post has a Service Officer and Chaplain positions who help veterans with obtaining benefits, social services and other local municipal and State benefits; alone with State and National Veterans benefits. Although these positions may change with each business year, the position is held by Evald (EJ) Johnson.

The American Legion administers the State of Connecticut's Soldiers' Sailors' and Marines' Fund. This fund provides temporary assistance (e.g., weekly assistance with rental payments, mortgage interest, medical and dental care, etc.) for any veteran who served a minimum of 90 days during a statutory wartime period, was honorably discharged and demonstrates need. The Post additionally assists other community-based organizations with labor and monetary donations. In the past Post 41 gave the Town over \$70,000.00 to help off-set the cost of building the Lymes' Senior Center and most recently, the Post donated \$37,500.00 to the Rocky Hill Veterans' Home for an aquatic therapy Pool. The Post has provided thousands of dollars to local organizations and events and there is probably a Legionnaire at every church repair project, helping at every blood drive, on every Town Committee, belongs to a community-based organization and is the first step up and lend helping hand.

Catholic Charities – Diocese of Norwich

The Office of Catholic Charities is the social service arm of the Catholic Church in the Diocese of Norwich. It provides a wide array of social services to the residents of New London County, Middlesex County, Windham County, Tolland County and Fishers Island, New York. It is funded by the Annual Bishop's Appeal, client fees, and gifts from individuals, corporations and foundations.

The **mission** of Catholic Charities in the Diocese of Norwich is to participate in the saving mission of Christ by providing compassionate, high-quality social services, counseling, education, research and advocacy, with special attention to the poor and disadvantaged.

The Office of Catholic Charities incorporates a number of ministries supportive of persons in crisis situations, regardless of race, ethnicity or religion. These include:

Basic Needs and Case Management Services are provided to individual and families in need of food, shelter, clothing, utility assistance, transportation, medications, information and referral. Clients are helped with immediate needs as well as with developing a plan of self-sufficiency for the future. Case management services include Employment Success Program through Department of Social Services which prepares individuals to successfully engage in their employment plan. There is no charge for these services.

Behavioral Health Services are offered to individuals, families and couples through individual, couple, family and group therapy. We offer 24-hour crisis intervention and emergency services, psychiatric evaluation and consultation, medication assessments. Specific programs include Adolescent Substance Abuse, Parent Education Program mandatory thorough court system for individuals going through divorce proceedings. Fees are based on a sliding scale. Many private insurance plans are accepted. Catholic Charities Behavioral Health Clinic is a Medicaid & Medicare provider. All costs are based on a sliding fee scale.

Pregnancy Services are provided to birth parents and family members, including pregnancy testing, counseling, parenting education, mentors, and foster homes for infants awaiting adoption placement.

Adoption Services to adoptive families, adopted children, and birth parents. The agency conducts home studies, relative searches, domestic and international adoptions. All costs are based on a sliding fee scale.

Family Support Services are offered to individuals and families, including such programs as marriage preparation, marriage enrichment, marriage support, separation and divorce support groups, grief management, singles support activities, natural family planning, parenting education, family life education workshops, chastity/abstinence programs, post-abortion reconciliation and counseling services, and volunteer leadership training.

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Another diocesan ministry, **St. Vincent dePaul Place**, in Middletown, ministers to poor and homeless people, providing a meal program, food pantry, clothing outlet and social service program. Services include counseling, case management, crisis intervention, community outreach, advocacy and referral. St. Vincent's support services staff provides case management for residents of Liberty Commons, a housing project with special consideration for the homeless.

The Church of Christ the King

Mission: The Church of Christ the King serves as the spiritual home to Roman Catholics in the area. It strives to spread the gospel of Jesus Christ in word, sacrament service and action.

Local/Regional Community Service: Parishioners at Christ the King support and participate in several community outreach programs, including ministry to the sick, prison ministry, the St. Vincent de Paul Place in Middletown, and the New London Meal Center, as well as a number of broader outreach initiatives.

On a larger scale, through its affiliation with the Diocese of Norwich (which includes the four counties of Middlesex, New London, Tolland and Windham in Connecticut and Fisher's Island in New York) the Church of Christ the King serves as the gateway to the diocesan programs run by Catholic Charities.

In the past year, in the Diocese of Norwich, Catholic Charities provided help to more than 12,000 individuals and their families through a variety of programs helping clients meet basic needs and supporting, strengthening and empowering them to attain the highest quality of life. The agency is especially dedicated to assisting those with the greatest needs who would not often be served by others

The agency's primary services include Emergency Financial Assistance provided to individual and families in need of food, shelter, clothing, utility assistance, transportation, medications, and housing (including mortgage delinquency counseling). Clients are also offered assistance in developing a plan for future self-sufficiency. Case Management, Behavioral Health, Adoption, Substance Abuse, Pregnancy Counseling and Parent Education services are a few of the many accredited programs available to everyone regardless of race, ethnicity, or religion at Catholic Charities.

Duck River Garden Club of Old Lyme

The goals of the club are to stimulate a greater interest in gardening and landscaping, to learn the elements of floral design, to create a greater awareness of nature and conservation, and to maintain the beauty of our town through our civic projects.

Plantings at seven major town locations and their maintenance continues to be a prime project for the club. A design team chooses the plants to coordinate the efforts throughout the town. A site leader oversees staffing and maintenance of each site. All members sign up to work at a specific site each year. Plants are chosen for spring, summer, fall and winter and a site cleanup is held each spring and winter.

Books on gardening and related subjects are donated each year to the Old Lyme Phoebe Griffin Noyes Library. A list of recommendations is submitted to the library by the Book chairman for purchase.

Every week throughout the year, members create a display for the reception area at the Old Lyme Phoebe Griffin Noyes Library incorporating plants and/or fresh or dried flowers and are encouraged to include related items in their designs. Several times a year members create fresh floral arrangements for the Lyme Art Association upon request and most recently for the dedication of the town hall. In 2008 members created arrangements to complement paintings in a singular exhibition "Impressionist Giverny: American painters in France, 12885-1915" for the Florence Griswold Museum.

Every year since 1991 members have gathered on Earth Day to do a large scale clean up at a prominent town location. In recent years this effort has been concentrated at the Post Office which serves both Lyme and Old Lyme. A major project this past year was the redesign of the plantings at the Post Office using primarily native plants.

Established in 1980, Duck River Garden Club scholarships are offered each year to deserving high school seniors who reside in Lyme or Old Lyme and plan their future college studies in the fields of horticulture, environmental science or a related field.

Eighteen 30" wreaths are created for all public buildings, schools, library, senior, youth and day-card centers in Old Lyme. Club members gather fresh greens, create the wreaths and large bows and personally deliver them to their designated locations. Members contribute a holiday basket to a needy family identified by Old Lyme Social Services. Members assist residents of Mariner Health Care at Bride Brook in East Lyme to make seasonal flower arrangements to enjoy in their own rooms or to give to their family.

The club only fundraiser is our Annual Plant Sale & Garden Fair. This event involves each and every member in its success and offers fine plants and planting advice from our experienced gardeners for the greater community.

The Estuary Council of Seniors, Inc.

Our mission: The Estuary Council of Seniors, Inc. (ECSI) is a nine-town community resource for seniors providing programs, services, education, and advocacy while promoting independent living. ECSI shall provide senior nutrition, transportation, health and support services, and socialization.

ECSI provides hot, nutritious lunches weekdays in the senior center at 220 Main St. We also serve breakfast week days from 7:45 am - 9:00 am and on Saturday from 8:00 am - noon. We ask for a \$2.50 donation from seniors 60 yrs. and older, and \$5.25 for breakfast and \$6.25 for lunch from individuals under 60 yrs.

ESCI delivers Meals On Wheels to homebound seniors 60 years and older including a hot lunch, frozen dinner, and frozen week-end meals as needed. A \$2.50 donation is requested per meal.

ECSI provides medical outpatient transportation (EMOTS) to medical appointments for seniors 60 yrs. and older to locations outside the 9-town Estuary Region. We ask for a \$25 round trip donation for the service.

ECSI offers FREE blood pressure, diabetes, and cholesterol screenings monthly for seniors. We also offer hearing screenings and free legal advice though Connecticut Legal Services.

ECSI offers Better Breathers, Diabetes, Widows/Widowers and Caregivers support groups.

ECSI offers benefits counseling to seniors for Medicare; Title XIX; ConnPACE; ConnMap; Supplemental Insurance; Living Wills; Power of Attorney; and a we have a lending closet for walkers, wheelchairs, etc.

ECSI offers health education programs, art courses, exercise programs, computer courses, and many social activities such as cards, billiards, and Wii. We also offer bus trips to various entertainment locations and shopping trips outside the 9-town Estuary Region.

ECSI runs a Thrift Shop in the lower level of the center. The Thrift Shop sells gently used clothing, housewares, books, games, and small furniture.

Our programs are offered at a very low or reduced fee or free. We are funded by Title III funds though Senior Resources Area Agency on Aging, the 9 towns we serve including Old Saybrook, individual donations, fund raising events, and grants.

Estuary Transit District (9 Town Transit)

The Estuary Transit District has been providing local bus service to the towns of Chester, Clinton, Deep River, Essex, Killingworth, Lyme, Old Lyme, Old Saybrook, and Westbrook. Estuary Transit District runs two basic types of services, Shuttle Routes, and Dial-A-Ride service. This service is called the 9 Town Transit service. All services are open to the general public.

The Shuttle Routes are "flex" routes that cover a ¾ mile corridor on each side of the main route. Our Shuttle routes run from the Old Saybrook Train Station to the Madison Stop & Shop, where passengers are able to connect with transportation to New Haven. Another Shuttle route goes from Old Saybrook to Chester and a route from Old Saybrook to Niantic with a connection to all of Southeastern Ct. Presently we are working on a Shuttle route from Old Saybrook to Middletown where we will be connecting with The Middletown Transit District buses.

The Dial-A-Ride service is a door to door service that runs in all nine towns. This service is by reservations at least 24 hours in advance, and covers anywhere in the nine town area.

Shuttle trips are \$1.25 each way and off route is \$2.50. Dial-A-Ride trips are \$2.50 each way.

Any resident age 60 or older many receive free transit tickets valid on any 9 Town Transit Service through a grant from the Senior Resources Agency on Aging with Title III funds made available under the Older Americans Act. To receive a ticket book call 9 Town Transit at 860-510-0429.

During the past year, Estuary Transit District's board of directors has been focused on ensuring the financial security of the district. This year, with the finances stable, the board plans to begin focusing on improving the service offered and increasing rider ship throughout the nine town area.

As more families of the beach community become permanent residents of the Town, the Federation has worked very hard in recent years to foster an improve relationship between the two groups.

To that end, the Federation has worked closely with the Police, Selectmen, and the Board of Finance. Through this combination of resources, the Federation purchased an ATV to provide improve security for the beaches, and the Town provided the cost of operations, maintained, and insurance. The Town further provided additional equipment for the vehicle. This purchase has improved security at the beaches between the hours of 10 and 3. If further has brought a positive working relationship between the beaches and the Town.

The Federation is aware that many of the residents of the beach community are experiencing economic difficulties. The Federation is committed to promoting the services of the Town in an effort to assist them during this time.

In return, The Federation offers the resources of personnel and facilities to assist the Town in serving and supporting the demands of providing services.

Lyme Municipal Agent for the Elderly

The role of the Municipal Agent for the Elderly is to disseminate information to elderly persons and assist them in learning about the community resources available to them. Listed below are the agencies and phone numbers most often requested by senior citizens in Lyme.

INFOLINE (dial 211) This is a telephone information, referral, advocacy, and crisis helpline. INFOLINE is free, confidential, and available 24 hours a day, every day.

Interim Healthcare (434-9003) Visiting nursing service is provided to the Town of Lyme by Interim Healthcare. A nurse from Interim Healthcare is at the Lymes' Senior Center every Friday form 12:00 PM -1:00 PM for Lyme residents.

Estuary Council of Senior Clubs (388-1611) Call for the following services: meal site reservations, homebound meal delivery, claims filing assistance, identification cards, information and referral, regular transportation for medical appointments and dial-a-ride to other community destinations.

Senior Resources (formerly Eastern CT Area Agency on Aging) (860-887-3561) Offers the CHOICES Program which provides older adults with health insurance counseling, information and referral to senior agencies, and eligibility screening for general state and federal benefits programs.

Thames Valley Council for Community Action (TVCCA) – Energy Assistance (860-889-1365) Administers the Connecticut Energy Assistance Program (CEAP), the State Appropriated Fuel assistance (SAFA) Program, and Contingency Heating Assistance program (CHAP) to help low income households pay their heating bills.

Lymes' Senior Center (860-434-1427) Lunchtime meal site, programs such as exercises, Tai Chi, computer instruction, card playing, pool table, creative writing, bingo, art lessons, jigsaw puzzle corner, outdoor lawn games.

Lymewood (860-434-2120) Elderly housing

Grandparents as Parents Support Program (GAPS) (860-887-3561) The DSS Elderly Services Division has developed a network of over 120 agencies, individual sand organizations that are providing service or assistance to grandparents and relatives who have taken on the responsibility of parenting.

Protective Services (1-888-385-4225 or 860-704-3046) If you suspect or believe that an elderly person age 60 or older is a victim of abuse, neglect (including self-neglect) or exploitation, contact Protective Services.

Lyme Municipal Agent for the Elderly (continued)

Connecticut Pharmaceutical Assistance Contract to the Elderly Programs (ConnPACE) (1-800-423-5026) the Department of Social Services operates the ConnPACE program, which pays the cost of prescription drugs, after a \$12 co-pay per prescription for people 65 and older. Effective Jan. q 2008, incomes must be under \$23,700 for single persons, or under \$31,900 for married couples. Applications are available at the Lyme Town hall or online at www.connpace.com.

Lyme Social Services

The primary function of Social Services in Lyme is to provide referral information to individuals and families who find themselves in need and do not know where to turn for help. Often those who call find themselves in temporary or difficult circumstances due to job loss, illness, divorce, etc. Often the calls come from concerned relatives, friends, and neighbors who want to help those they care about find the help they need. Fortunately we live in a time and place where that kind of caring and concern still exists.

Most calls are for referrals to financial and medical assistance programs provided through the State of Connecticut Department of Social Services, or for fuel assistance provided through the Thames Valley Council for Community Action (TVCCA) who administers the Connecticut Energy Assistance Program (CEAP) in New London County. The Town of Lyme appropriates funds annually for TVCCA to assist them with this vital work.

Occasionally calls are received for emergency situations, such as when a fuel tank is empty or a fire has occurred. Through generous donations by local individuals and organizations, emergency needs can usually be met.

Included in the Town of Lyme's Annual Report is a comprehensive listing of agencies and organizations that provide assistance for a variety of needs. This is particularly helpful for those who find it difficult to make that phone call asking for help. For those who do make the call, all efforts are made to insure that they receive the referrals, resources, and reassurance they need.

Old Lyme Affordable Housing, Inc Les Reynolds, Executive Director

OLAH is an all-volunteer, independent, 501(c)(3) corporation, created in 1993 by the Lyme/Old Lyme Council of Churches and congregations to address the Town's affordable housing issues.

Status

We have the skills, finances and Community Land Trust know-how to build and sell houses to qualified buyers - one at a time - any time we have land, at virtually no cost to the Town. Few social services can make that claim.

This year we have had no new property. Our three existing homes are fine but we need to give more support to the young families Old Lyme needs to balance its mix of residents. Our focus to date has been on enabling affordable homes for young people - our adult children, teachers, school workers, firefighters, business employees, ambulance workers, social service providers.

Background

We have built three "forever affordable" homes for 4 candidate families (one family moved nearer their job in Ledyard). We are prepared to build or acquire houses and sell them to qualified first time home-buyers with household income below 80% of the region's median income whenever we have land on which to build. The properties are held by OLAH as Community Land Trusts, and the homes are held by the owners, using Essex Savings Bank mortgages, nothing down, good rates, and virtually no closing costs. Home owners pay taxes on their houses, and when they move on we work together to transfer home ownership to our next approved candidate.

Members and staffs of three churches in Old Lyme (First Congregational, St. Ann's Episcopal and Christ the King Roman Catholic) have provided critical financial and volunteer staffing support for OLAH, with help from individuals, businesses, and a few foundations.

The Kiernan & McCulloch families donated land for our three houses. We seek more gifts of buildable land (or fixer-upper houses) so that church/community volunteer work teams can do much of the building, lowering building costs with a gain in community involvement). The land must be available at almost no cost because we hold the land in trust to keep the houses forever affordable, and we cannot recover money spent on land or property acquisition.

In searching for land donors, we work with Town Officials, Landowners, Developers, Realtors, Architects, Attorneys, Legislators, Community & Church Leaders, Estate Managers, Non-Profits, Foundations, Business & Professional Managers, Corporations, Philanthropists and any other interested individuals. We seek help from volunteers who want to help deliver affordable housing.

Old Lyme Phoebe Griffin Noyes Library

The mission of the Old Lyme Phoebe Griffin Noyes Library is to serve as a center of information for the Old Lyme community and to foster the cultural enhancement and development of an informed and knowledgeable community of Old Lyme residents.

In pursuit of this mission, the library assembles, organizes, preserves and administers collections of books and other educational and recreational materials to provide free and convenient access to these collections by our patrons. This is further enhanced by the trained professional and support staff who actively encourage the use of library resources, services and programs.

Collections in greatest demand are best selling books, DVDs, and audio books Last year, the Old Lyme library circulated approximately 76,000 items and held 205 programs attended by 3,550 participants. Additionally the library has seven computer workstations, and there were 10,000 uses of these computers last year. We also have five laptop computers with wireless connections to available for use within the library. Patrons can also connect to our wireless connection using their own laptops.

The library is a frequent collaborator with the many groups and organizations based in town. Our Homebound Services Program delivers books to persons who are temporarily or permanently homebound. The success of this program is due in part to our strong relationship with the Lymes' Senior Center. The Library also lends curricular support, staff expertise, and programming resources to collaborate with the Regional School District #18 and Lymes' Youth Service Bureau (LYSB).

The Library has worked cooperatively with local arts organizations, the LYSB, the Chamber of Commerce, and the Town organizing the Midsummer Festival. More recently, we have shared resources and expertise with the Old Lyme Historical Society, by providing part-time use of the Old Lyme Room housing genealogical collections.

On a somewhat smaller scale, the library has conducted a "Food for Fines" program which resulted in the donation of over 100 pounds of non-perishable food items to the Shoreline Soup Kitchens and Pantry, and the Friends of the Library donate used books and videos to area hospitals and treatment centers.

Like many libraries, we are experiencing increased demand for our services during these difficult economic times. We look forward to working with local social service agencies to continue and expand these efforts in order to best serve the needs of our community.

Old Lyme Visiting Nurse Association, Inc.

Since its founding in 1922, the Old Lyme Visiting Nurse Association has, through the provision of information and direct services, remained committed to the health and well-being of our community. With the help of donations, gifts, and memorial bequests, we have offered free health care to thousands of people in Old Lyme and Lyme.

We continued this tradition in 2008. The town nurse, Linda Camarra, made 556 home visits and reported 1, 123 client visits to her office in the Lymes' Senior Center. In addition, with the assistance of our dedicated corps of volunteers, we reached 869 people through clinics, a health fair and testing and screening programs. Our services remain available to a broad spectrum of local residents, allowing us to stay true to our motto of "Caring for All Ages."

Services

Home Health Visits House calls from the town nurse are available for anyone confined at home because of ill health. The nurse makes periodic check-up visits to evaluate the person's health status and consults with family members or medical personnel as needed.

At-Home Skilled Care These services are available through our agreement with Interim HealthCare. Interim Health Care provides a full range of services including, skilled nursing, therapists (physical, occupational, speech/language), certified home health aids, companions/homemakers, and medical social workers.

Free Consultations The town nurse's office at the Lymes' Senior Center is accessible to all she is available for walk-in visits each weekday from 12 noon to 1 p.m. The office phone number is 434-7808.

Home Visits for New Parents; Referrals for Uninsured Children A free at-home consultation from the town nurse is available for any parent with a newborn. Appointments may be scheduled by calling her office. For other medical needs, we refer uninsured children to the State of Connecticut's HUSKY program. Information is available by calling the toll-free phone number: 1-877-CTHUSKY.

Preventive Health Care We provide a wide variety of preventive services each year: flu and pneumonia immunizations, blood pressure checks, adult audio and memory screening, and a blood pressure clinic and health presentation at the district high school.

Annual Health Day Held each November, this event offers diagnostic blood tests, physician and other medical professional screenings and consultations for skin cancer and for vision, dental, and foot health; blood pressure checks; and dietitian and nurse consultations. At display tables staffed by health care personnel, we offer free literature, samples, and home test kits. Other services are added yearly to meet anticipated community needs.

Pre-Kindergarten Audio/Visual Clinic This service, conducted each spring, tests the hearing and vision of incoming students to help ensure their readiness for learning. The clinic is free and staffed with professionals in each field, and is coordinated with the district's elementary school nurses and office personnel.

Warm the Children

The Warm the Children Fund buys winter clothing for children-in-need. Warn the Children is neighbor helping neighbor. All the money donated is used to buy winter clothing. The need is great, especially with the uncertain economic times. Last year 41 Old Lyme children were supported. This year's target is 100 Old Lyme children. The program will be publicized through media and one-on-one meetings.

How the Program Works

The management of the program is handled by Jason Smith, who is responsible for the money end of the program, while Walter Osborne is responsible for the selection of "THE SHOPPERS." "THE SHOPPERS" are the people from various towns who volunteer their time to assist needy families. Walter also handles the interface with "WAL-MART" the store that is used for the purchases.

The lists of needy families are developed by "SOCIAL SERVICES with the assistance of YOUTH and FAMLY SERVICES" of each town who check to make sure that there is a need. The family names are kept in strict confidence. The towns currently in the program are: Chester, Deep River, Essex, Lyme, Old Lyme, Old Saybrook and Westbrook.

Each town in turn sends a list of the needy families to Walter who develops a PO for each child and/or children.

Each SHOPPER is given a Purchase Order which includes the parent/Guardian name, phone number, children's names, age/sex (age goes up to 16). The value of the PO is \$90.00 per child. The family member meets the shopper at Wal-Mart and assists with the paper work.

Historically the Pictorial Gazette was the means of getting the message out. However the Pictorial Gazette has closed. The program plans to use a mix of media and one-on-one meetings.
